## **Coos County Historical Society Annual Award Winners**

\* The **Nathan Douthit Local Historian Award**, named in his honor in 2017, is given annually to a person or persons who have made significant contributions to the preservation of history in our area. **Douthit** was a history graduate of Harvard and the University of California, Berkeley, who came to Coos County in 1969 and taught history at Southwestern Oregon Community College for the next 28 years. Besides his teaching career, Douthit was active in the preservation of local history. He served the Coos Historical Society for many years and also became a founder and officer of the Marshfield Sun Printing Museum. He has authored several books on local history. Two of them, *A Guide to South Coast History: Traveling the Jedediah Smith Trail* and *The Coos Bay Region: Life on a Coastal Frontier* are still valuable resources used by many history students today.

+ The **Martha Butler Service Award** is given to a person or persons who have provided exceptional assistance or service to the Coos County Historical Society or museum. Mrs. Butler made a substantial donation to the Coos County Historical Society in 1999 that provided the seed money to build the new Coos History Museum by 2015. The award was named in her honor in 2017.

# The Mary Banks Granger Maritime History Award is given to a person or persons who contributes to the preservation of maritime-related history. Mary, the daughter of shipbuilder Robert Banks, and the Granger Family have preserved the history of the Kruse & Banks Shipbuilding Company of North Bend and have donated generously to the museum. This award was created by the board, and named in honor of Mrs. Granger, in 2017.

- \* Andie Jensen: Andie moved to Coos Bay in 2007 and soon thereafter began researching and writing about local history. He has authored eight books that have contributed to our understanding of local history.
  - + **Tom Orsi.** Tom volunteers both at the Bandon Historical Museum and the Coos History Museum. At the CHM, he has helped clean and organize our exhibit hall, volunteered at the front desk and has been a trained volunteer host in our Lansing Research Library. In addition, Tom is the leader of the South Coast Striders and has developed and promoted annual history walks in North Bend, Bandon, and Coos Bay.
  - **# Tom Leahy.** Tom is one of the founders and officers of the Coos Bay Boat Building Center which has increased the knowledge of our local maritime heritage by encouraging hands-on maritime construction and preservation of local maritime history. Tom has been the driving force of annual visits of the Tall Ships to Coos Bay each spring. Tom was also helpful in acquiring and repairing one of the major outdoor exhibits on the CHM plaza: the *Welcome*.

\* Bert Dunn. inspired to raise money to digitize historic newspapers from his hometown of Coquille, Dunn helped raise thousands of dollars and now decades of Coquille newspapers are easily accessible and searchable by the public as a result. In 2019, Bert and two co-authors researched the history of Coquille and published *Images of America: Coquille, Oregon.*+ Arlene Roblan. Arlene became a CHM Board member in 2014 and served as Education Committee Chair for six years. With her team, Arlene put a great effort into re-designing and updating the museum's education program. Arlene has also done wonderful work on museum board fundraising events and has volunteered with other community organizations.

+ **Toni Ann Brend.** Toni Ann had deep roots here with generations of Coquille Tribal ancestors. Toni Ann served over 17 years on her tribal council and for years taught young the cultural artistry of her tribe. She served several terms on the board of the Coos History Museum helped out with the museum's 4<sup>th</sup> Grade Indian Education program, headed the Governance Committee, and produced fine crafts for museum fundraisers.

**# Roger Ott.** Roger grew up in an Allegany family that worked on the Coos River for several generations. Roger has often shared his collection of historic photos of the "Mosquito Fleet" with the public. He has made numerous presentations on the history of Coos River water transportation for the Coos History Museum, the Coos Bay Public Library, and the Coos County OSU Extension Service and contributed to a video history of the Elliott State Forest for the SWOCC Forestry Department.

\* **Steven Greif** is a long time museum trustee and volunteer. He volunteers at the front desk, works with the CHM education programs, and serves on the exhibit committee. Steve has published a book on the history of North Bend High School and teaches local history classes for Museum as a fundraiser for the CHM.

+ **Bill Mast** has many years of service as a trustee and volunteer. He authored a book on Coos County agricultural history and conducts history tours in the summer months to places of interest in the region. The beautiful myrtlewood benches in the museum were donated by Bill.

+ **Don Ivy** was a valuable asset to the museum as a trustee and a representative of the Coquille Tribe. He helped create the museum's unique Welcome Gallery. His legacy of leadership, community spirit, and service to others is felt by many.

**# Bob Granger, John Granger, and Sue Graves** are descendants of the Kruse & Banks family of North Bend shipbuilders. They created a website of this local family's shipbuilding history and have generously donated artifacts to the maritime section of the museum.

2022 \* **Mary Schamehorn** saved thousands of photographs of the Bandon area from destruction and has written a weekly "As I See It" local history column several Coos County newspapers for many years. She has also served on the Bandon History Museum board.

\* Zachary Stocks served as the director of the Oregon Black Pioneers museum and helped the CHM with Alonzo Tucker events and the museum's first Juneteenth event. He also initiated the construction of an Oregon State Historical Marker at the diverse mining community of Beaver Hill. + Nancy Price was once an employee of the history museum at its North Bend location. Later in life, she became a cheerful front desk volunteer for several years when the new Coos History Museum opened in Coos Bay in 2015. She also took on many other volunteer roles at the museum. Nancy died in March of 2022 and this award was made posthumously.

+ **Carol Ventgen** joined the Coos Historical Society board of trustees in 2012 after retiring as director of the Coos Bay Public Library. She served several terms as board president in the crucial years of construction and opening of the new Coos History Museum in Coos Bay. Since the museum opened to the public in 2015 Carol, along with her husband Mike Perkins, have been a welcoming volunteer presence each week at the museum's front desk.

**# The Coos Bay Boat Building Center** is recognized for its efforts to further public education about maritime life and create positive economic benefits for our community from 2009 until its closure in 2022. The Center held numerous canoe and boat building classes; children's wood working events; paddle board, oar and skateboard construction; participated in the STEM program with School District 9; and did skills training for AYA students. Perhaps most notably, the Center hosted the annual spring visits of the Tall Ships.
